- A first aid kit should be taken and should stay with the member(s) of staff who stay in an accessible location.
- If pupils explore on their own, they must carry any emergency medication (eg inhalers) and must be capable of administering it.
- In the event of food poisoning, teachers and the LOLA staff responsible will act rapidly to get the student to a hospital or medical centre
- Extra caution must be exercised at venues visited after dark

- Ensure that pupils who need emergency medication must have it with them

Other points:

- It is good practice to ensure that pupils are supervised by a member of staff of the same gender whilst changing
- In extreme weather conditions, the lifeguard has the final say on whether or not the activity will commence

Events/ circumstances that would increase risk:

- Poor weather conditions
- Darkness travel at night
- Lack of familiarity with foreign road rules particularly relevant to crossing roads

- Pupils under the age of 18 are not permitted to buy alcohol or tobacco
- The location should have been pre-visited and checked through for hazards that may need to be taken account of or avoided, and emergency exits located
- A first aid kit should be taken and should stay with the member(s) of staff
- In the event of food poisoning, teachers and the LOLA staff responsible will act rapidly to get the student to a hospital or medical centre
- Extra caution must be exercised at venues visited after dark



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Assessment of risk for: COVID

All COVID protocols depend on current Spanish Health legislation. They govern the need or not of:

- Use of a Face covering
- Quarantine
- Social distance
- Permission to travel

Currently, the use of a face covering is not required. Those infected can attend class and travel but must use FFP2 masks inside buildings (in class or with families).

- If an activity implies the impossibility of wearing a mask, those infected must remain outdoors.

- Accommodation arrangements stay the same if a student becomes infected unless a member of the family is in a high risk group in which case the student is moved to alternative accommodation and required to pay the difference if this costs more (ie hotel).

If a student and/or teacher is not permitted to travel home **all additional expenses on the trip/prolongation of accommodation would be borne by** the participant.
